



**Medicaid Medical
Transportation
Program
Average Cost per Trip**

**As Required by
House Bill 1, 86th Legislature,
Regular Session, 2019 (Article
II, HHSC, Rider 12b)**

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1. Introduction

The General Appropriations Act, House Bill 1, 86thth Legislature, Regular Session, 2019 (Article II, Health and Human Services Commission [HHSC], Rider 12b) requires HHSC to submit a report of the average cost per trip provided through the Medical Transportation Program (MTP) for each fiscal year of the biennium. The report is due not later than 180 days after the end of each fiscal year.

This report details the methodology for establishing the pre-audit cost per trip¹ for fiscal years 2018 and 2019. While the numbers are not final for fiscal years 2018 and 2019, the preliminary calculation is \$46.84 and \$43.69 respectively. Fiscal year 2017 costs were previously reported as \$47.89. The final average cost per trip for the prior fiscal year, fiscal year 2017, is \$47.55 and reflect post audit finding adjustments. The cost per trip for fiscal year 2018 was not available when HHSC submitted the fiscal year 2019 report and is included in this report.

The report also calculates the cost per trip for fiscal years 2011 through 2017. When comparing historical costs, it is important to note that the program design underwent significant changes. For example, in fiscal year 2015, medical transportation services completed a statewide transition from a fee-for-service model to the use of medical transportation organizations (MTOs) with a per member per month (PMPM) capitated pricing model. While there are limitations in comparing costs due to the program restructuring, the report presents program costs and cost per trip for MTP for fiscal years 2011 through 2019 with a consistent methodology which allows for comparisons despite significant program changes over time.

2. Medical Transportation Program Costs

To provide insight into the efficiency of the program, HHSC identified five key measures. These five measures are:

1. Total net program cost;
2. Total member-months;
3. Cost per member per month;
4. Total number of trips; and
5. Average number of trips per member.

Using a consistent methodology, HHSC calculated member cost for fiscal years 2011 through 2019² and provided a comparison below in Chart 1.

The total net program cost is composed of all payments made toward the operation and administration of MTP, including HHSC's staffing costs less any experience rebate received.³ This reflects the true cost of the program. From fiscal years 2011 to 2019, the total net program costs have decreased by \$69.9 million, which represents a 30 percent decrease.

Total member-months is calculated by adding the total number of members enrolled for each month of the year. Between fiscal years 2011 and 2015, the total member-months increased by 14 percent. Finalized figures from fiscal year 2015, the first year of the statewide MTO PMPM capitated pricing model, reflect a total program cost decrease of \$49.7 million (21 percent) from fiscal year 2011. Between fiscal years 2015 and 2019, total member-months decreased 3.8 percent and the program realized a \$20.2 million (11 percent) decrease in total program costs. From fiscal years 2011 to 2019, there was a 10 percent increase in member-months and a 30 percent decrease in total program costs.

The cost per member per month is determined by the total net program cost divided by the total member-months on an annual basis. With a decrease in total



net program cost and increase in total-members, the cost per member has gone down.

Between fiscal years 2011 and 2019, the total number of trips decreased by 43 percent and the average number of trips per member decreased by 48 percent.

3. Average cost per trip

The pre-audit cost per trip for fiscal years 2018 and 2019 is \$46.84 and \$43.69 respectively, as calculated following a methodology established by HHSC. This is a preliminary number since the average cost per trip will decrease when adjusted with the result from the fiscal years 2018 and 2019 audits of the MTOs' reported expenses, which MTOs report on the financial statistical reports (FSRs) submitted to HHSC. The FSRs are audited annually by an independent audit firm contracted by HHSC as part of the established contract oversight process. This auditor reviews each FSR for correct and appropriate reported expenses. HHSC does not have final annual expenses until these audits are complete. Removing unallowable costs will reduce the total expenses reported by the MTO. Upon completion of the annual audits, the experience rebate will be recalculated, which will likely further decrease the average cost per trip.

Historically, multiple methodologies have been utilized to calculate the cost per trip. This created difficulty in comparing the realized cost between state fiscal years. To address this, HHSC calculated the cost per trip using a common methodology for fiscal years 2011 through 2019.

The total net program cost is the numerator for the calculation of average cost per member. The trip count is the denominator. Trip count is based on authorizations for each trip type. One authorization is representative of a single leg of a round trip. All trip types -- demand response, individual transportation participant, mass transit, paratransit, airfare, and intercity bus -- are included. Meals and lodging are ancillary benefits to a trip and not considered a trip. Therefore, these services are not included in the trip count. The number of individuals being transported (such as attendants traveling with clients) does not impact the trip count.

Total Net Program Cost = capitated payments + payment adjustments + HHSC administrative expense - received experience rebates.

Total Trips = demand response, individual transportation participant, mass transit, paratransit, airfare, intercity bus trips per authorization.

Total Net Program Cost / Total Trips = cost per trip.
